After 10 weeks, 65 tons of chalk, 75 metres of revetment, 275 chestnut posts, 25 tons of gravel, 30 x 3 metres of coir rolls, and 496 Volunteer hours, our works along the Itchen Navigation have drawn to a close.

With an average of four members of staff on site, four days a week, those volunteer hours really do speak for themselves. We genuinely could not have completed this project without our fantastic volunteers.

You turned up in all conditions, including the rain (yes, it did rain a couple of times during those 10 weeks!), as well as through some incredibly hot weather. Thank you all so much for your hard work, positive attitudes, and sheer determination.

We suspect some of you are in no rush to push another wheelbarrow anytime soon and may shudder at the sight of a pile of chalk! However, if you fancy a lovely walk, and perhaps a refreshing ice cream from Platform 1 Coffeehouse & Gelateria at Shawford Station, we can highly recommend a visit to see the finished result for yourselves.

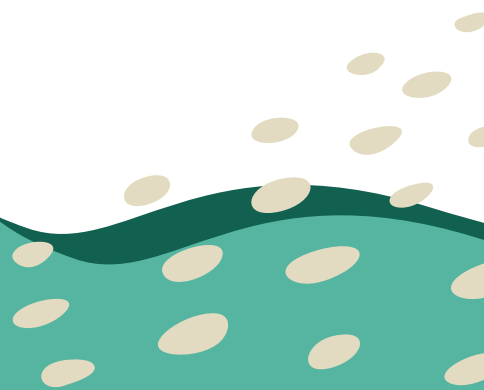

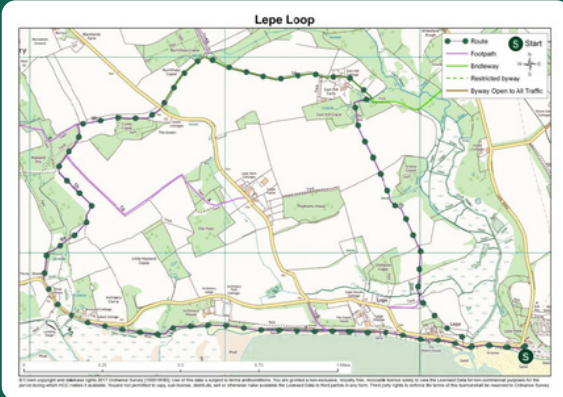

Lepe Loop Improvements

In June Kate spent a morning with Senior Ranger Abi Young at Lepe Country Park looking at improvements along the popular Lepe Loop.

Abi and Kate had previously looked at this route when making a funding application bid last year, but unfortunately that application was unsuccessful. However, we were very fortunate to have a separate application approved by New Forest National Park Authority.

We had to scale down our ambitions, but the funding will cover the cost of 2 new bridges and a boardwalk which are in need of replacement.

The new structures have arrived in kit form and are made of

Re-Life fully recycled plastic. The material is much better suited for wetland environments and areas with high use. The material will not require treatment or preservatives and very little ongoing maintenance.

“Re-Life fully recycled plastic boardwalk systems are built entirely from 100% recycled plastic (and a few steel fixings). Posts, joists and deck boards are all designed to handle constant moisture, ground movement and heavy footfall without rotting, warping or splitting.” builtybybison July 2026.

Working with the staff and volunteers at Lepe Country Park, Kate and Abi will be installing the boardwalk mid-August and the bridges will be installed by contractors later in the year. These structures will be a great improvement to this route which is especially popular in the summer with visitor from the nearby camp sites.

The Confraternity of St James (CSJ)

Step up to Help Out



The St James' Way is a waymarked modern-day Camino in the South of England. It is approximately 68.5 miles/110 kilometres long.

The route, devised by members of the Camino St James follows a probable route taken by medieval pilgrims on their way to Santiago de Compostela from Reading Abbey.

This route includes much of the Itchen Navigation. You may remember that some volunteers from CSJ joined the South West Access volunteers in February to battle through some brambles near Eastleigh.

Well, they've gone a step further now and 2 of their volunteers have completed a LANTRA brushcutter course so they can tackle the vegetation independently.

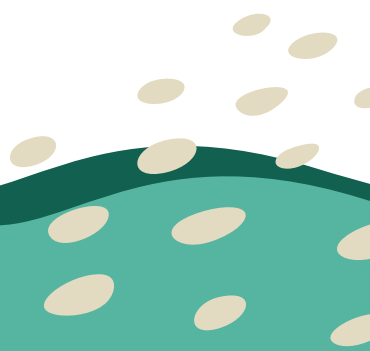
Peter and David spent the day in deepest darkest Wiltshire, getting to grips with the brushcutters under the guidance of their tutor Vicky.

Now they are fully trained and ticketed they have already borrowed brushcutters from the South West team. This month they were joined by a small team of CSJ volunteers, and together they've made a big dent in the vegetation from Bishopstoke to Mans Bridge.

We also been fortunate to welcome CSJ volunteers to our revetment task days, where they've got stuck in helping the rangers repairing and install revetments, coir rolls and faggots along this beautiful stretch of chalk stream.

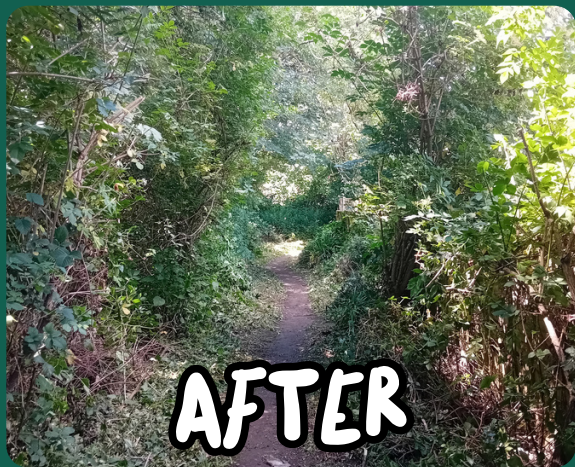

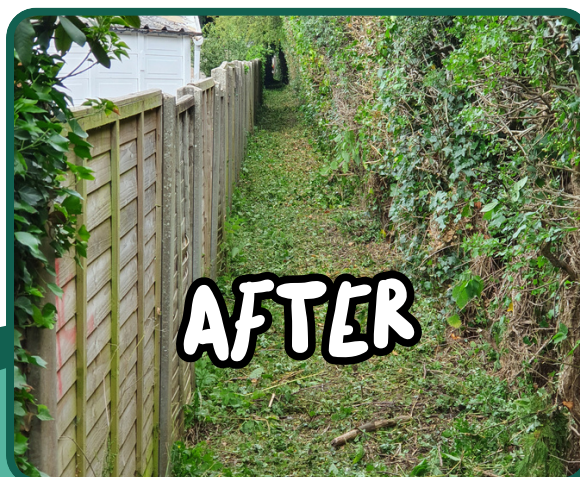
Timely Tadley Trimming

This month, volunteers joined CER Andy in the parish of Tadley to help open up key routes through the busy urban areas.

With the schools breaking up for the summer, these routes will undoubtedly see increased footfall. The North East volunteers helped make them safer and free from obstructions.

The first route cleared was Footpath 20, a well-used path connecting Tadley Hill with Fairlawn Road via Swedish Houses. Bordered by a steep embankment, this path supports vigorous vegetation growth, which can quickly encroach onto the route and hang at head height, creating an obstacle for path users.

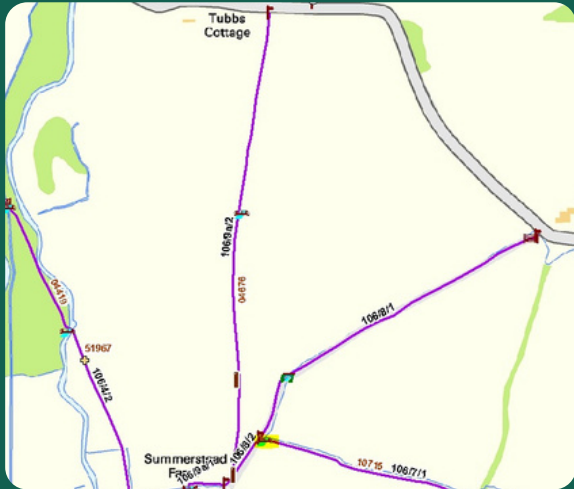
The second route was Footpath 11. This path had become completely overgrown during the spring and was impassable along much of its length.

Armed with the appropriate machinery, our volunteers set to work and successfully transformed this narrow route. What had been an inaccessible path is now open once again, providing a safe and convenient link for local residents and visitors.

A Day on the Tools: Rangers at Work

With roughly 3,000 miles of rights of way stretching across around 267 parishes, the team is constantly on the move throughout the county, maintaining and improving the network for all users.

Every now and then, however, they hold a "Ranger Task Day", setting aside time in their calendars to work together on a specific project while sharing skills, knowledge and tips picked up throughout the year.

This month, CER Andy was joined by Ranger Mitch and Officer Pete to install a new ditch crossing in the parish of Hartley Wespall.

Footpath 7 had a bridge in need of replacement. With split, bowing sleepers and no usable handrail or support, improvements were necessary to ensure the safety of its users.

Refreshing their skills and putting their teamwork to the test, the North East Access Team completed the installation of a new and improved ditch crossing, while also setting a new record for installation time.

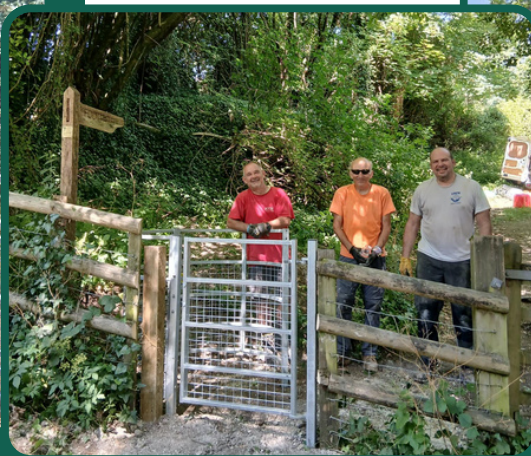
Miles without Stiles Continues

A special thank you goes out to all the landowners who agreed to change their stiles to gates and have also helped with access. This allowed our volunteers and teams to get as close to site as possible - making the work much easier and more efficient!
